A Quick Look at the Figures 2015

- 244 million international migrants; 150 million migrant workers
- Health worker shortage: 12.9 million health workers by 2035 (WHO)
- 65 million forcibly displaced due to persecution, conflict, violence and human rights violations
- 21.3 million refugees, more than half (51%) are children below 18 years of age
- 86% of world's refugees hosted by developing countries
- Between 2008 and 2014, 18.4 million were displaced by climate-related disasters
- Up to 1 billion people at risk of displacement if climate change not addressed
- Conflicts, climate change, human rights violations, poverty, unemployment, labour shortages and demographics – drivers of mobility and displacement in coming years

2018 Adoption of a Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration, Culminated by an intergovernmental conference on international migration



Signing of the UN-IOM Cooperation Agreement. Under the relationship, the UN explicitly recognizes the IOM as an independent, autonomous and non-normative international organization with a global leading role in the field of migration.
